O Lord Jesus Christ, our Good Shepherd, as you once gathered lost sheep that they might hear Your voice and be your flock, so also today graciously look down from heaven upon our parish community, and send down on it your Holy Spirit, that it might be a place to receive the joy of Your Good News. Strengthen us with your presence, and always gather us together in prayer. Grant us the spirit of serving others, so that in our parish all might encounter You, the merciful God. Bless our spiritual leaders with Your wisdom, and inspire us to generously give of our time, talents and treasure for the building up of Your Kingdom. Unite us in peace and harmony, as befits Your community of love. Instill in us a missionary spirit, and let our parish community shine with the light of the Gospel, with prayer and good works, inviting all to share in the divine life, so that Your Name, O Saviour, may be praised, together with Your eternal Father, and your most-holy, good and life-giving Spirit. Amen.

On the 4th Sunday after Pentecost we celebrate the memory of the astonishing and holy people which the Holy Spirit produced on the lands of Ukraine.

The Church shows us these extraordinary people - key people - who are nonetheless ordinary people, like us. They are extraordinary because despite all their weaknesses, their mistakes and their sins they always kept on moving towards the highest of callings with faith and faithfulness, with humility and confidence. They hesitated. They often fell down along the way. They were sometimes full of anguish, doubt and pain. But they always ended by getting up again and pushing on towards the light and the truth, towards love and goodness. Thus they

were also very ordinary people - like us. By honouring the saints we honour God, for respect shown to them is respect shown to God. The saints did not become saints through their own power; their holiness is the result of God's grace. All they are they owe to God.

Liturgical Propers:

The Bishop is greeted in front of the church (at the door) with bread & salt and with flowers. Pastor presents Bishop with a hand cross for the procession into the church. After greeting (still at the doors):

Priest: May the Lord bless you from Zion, and may you know Jerusalem's blessings all the days of your life, always, now, and forever.

All: Amen. Blessed be the name of the Lord, always, now and forever.

Troparion (Tone 3): Let the heavens be glad, let the earth rejoice, for the Lord has done a mighty deed with his arm. He trampled death by death; He became the first born of the dead; He saved us from the abyss of Hades and granted great mercy to the world.

Troparion (Tone 4): O you, who glorified Christ: princes and bishops, monastics and martyrs, and steadfast confessors of Christian Ukraine throughout all times, pray Christ God to look with favour on our people and to grant them the grace to persevere in the faith that the souls of prayerful faithful who revere your sacred memory may be saved.

Glory be to the Father and to the Son and to the Holy Spirit:

Kontakion (Tone 4): You shine as bright beacons, O God-inspired and righteous saints of our Church. By your encouraging example you serve communities of faithful throughout the Christian world. Therefore we humbly bow our heads to you thanking our great and all-gracious God, Who has made you our intercessors in heaven, where you pray for our souls.

Now and for ever and ever. Amen.

Kontakion (Tone 3): Today the Virgin stands before us in the church, and together with the choirs of saints invisibly prays to God for us. Angels are worshiping with hierarchs; apostles exalt with prophets, for the Mother of God prays in our behalf to the eternal God.

Prokimenon (Tone 3): Sing to our God, sing; sing to our King, sing (Ps 46:7).

Verse: Rejoice in the Lord, O you just; praise befits the righteous (Ps 32:1).

Prokimenon (Tone 7): Precious in the sight of the Lord is the death of His venerable ones (Ps 115:6).

Epistle: A reading from the Letter of St. Paul to the Romans: (Rom. 6:18-23)

Brethren, freed from your sin, you became slaves of justice. (I use following example from human affairs because of your weak human nature.) Just as formerly you enslaved your bodies to impurity and licentiousness for their degradation; make them now the servants of justice for their sanctification. When you were slaves of sin, you had freedom from justice. What benefit did you



then enjoy? Things you are now ashamed of, all of them tending toward death. But now that you are freed from sin and have become slaves of God, your benefit is sanctification as you tend toward eternal life. The wages of sin is death, but the gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord.

Alleluia (Tone 3): In You, O Lord, have I hoped that I may not be put to shame for ever (Ps 30:2). Be a protector unto me, O God, and a house of refuge to save me (Ps 30:3). Blessed is the man who fears the Lord; he shall delight exceedingly in His commandments (Ps 111:1).

Gospel: (Matthew 8:5-13)

At that time, as Jesus entered Capernaum, a centurion approached him, with this request: 'Sir, my serving boy is at home in bed paralyzed, suffering painfully.' He said to him, 'I will come and cure him.' 'Sir,' the centurion said in reply, 'I am not worthy to have you under my roof. Just give an order and my boy will get better. I am a man under authority myself and I have troops assigned me. If I give one man the order, "Dismissed", off he goes. If I say to another, "Come here," he comes. If I tell my slave, "Do this", he does it.' Jesus showed amazement on hearing this and remarked to his followers, 'I assure you, I have never found this much faith in Israel. Mark what I say! Many will come from the east and the west and will find a place at the banquet in the kingdom of God with Abraham, Isaac and Jacob. While the natural heirs of the kingdom will be driven out into the dark. Waling will be heard there, and the grinding of teeth.' To the centurion Jesus said, 'Go home. It shall be done because you trusted.' That very moment the boy got better.

Communion Verses: Praise the Lord from the heavens; praise Him in the highest (Ps 148:1). Rejoice in the Lord, O you just; praise befits the righteous (Ps 32:1). Alleluia! (x3)

Our Eparch, Bishop Ken is requesting that at the conclusion of every Divine Liturgy we say an additional prayer for Peace in Ukraine until the end of the war. For peace in Ukraine, let us pray: Our Father ... Hail Mary ... Glory be to the Father and to the Son and to the Holy Spirit, now and for ever and ever. Amen.

Pope sets up group to allocate crisis funds in Ukraine

After raising funds for humanitarian relief in Ukraine through a special collection in Europe, Pope Francis has established a committee to decipher the most urgent needs and get help to where it's most needed.

According to a June 9 communique from the Vatican "the Pope has decided to establish a specific technical committee on-site, composed of a president and four members" to help with the distribution of the funds raised through the collection.

The president of the committee, appointed by the Vatican's Secretary of State Cardinal Pietro Parolin in a recent letter, is Bishop Jan Sobilo, auxiliary bishop of the Diocese of Kharkiv- Zaporizhia. The Latin rite diocese is located in northeastern Ukraine, near to the front line of the separatist-held areas in Luhansk and Donetsk oblasts.

It will be up to Bishop Sobilo, a native of Poland, to name the other members of the committee apart from one, who will be appointed jointly by the *Caritas Internationalis* and the Pontifical Council *Cor Unum*.

The formation of the committee, which has been given a year-long mandate, follows Pope Francis' decision to take up an April 24 collection in all the Catholic parishes of Europe to promote humanitarian support for all those suffering or displaced due to the fighting in eastern Ukraine.

Conflict erupted in Ukraine in November 2013, when the former government refused to sign the Association Agreement with the European Union, leading to months of violent protests. Tensions deepened in February 2014, when the country's former president was ousted following the protests, and a new government appointed. In March of that year, Ukraine's eastern peninsula of Crimea was annexed by Russia, and pro-Russian separatists have since taken control of eastern portions of Ukraine.

More than 6,500 people, including civilians, have died in the fighting between Ukraine's military and the separatists. Roughly 2 million others have been forced to flee due to violence and a lack of basic humanitarian necessities such as food and medicine. The rebels have been supported by both Russian arms and troops, according to both Ukraine and Western nations. A ceasefire was brokered and officially began Feb. 15, 2015; however, the agreement fell through and low-level fighting has continued, with new deaths reported each day.

Pope Francis' collection was aimed "exclusively for the benefit of the victims of the war, without distinction of religion, confession, or ethnicity." The headquarters of the new committee tasked with distributing the funds raised will be located in the Curia of the Kharkiv-Zaporizhia diocese. Those who work with the committee, either at the headquarters or in the field, will do so on a volunteer basis to ensure that all of the funds raised by the collection will benefit those affected by the war. According to the Vatican communique, Cardinal Parolin's letter appointing the committee's president also stipulated certain conditions for proposals on what the funds will be used for.

One stressed that any proposals must be received directly from inter-religious or interconfessional establishments, from individuals areas of need, or from individual bishops, including non-Catholics, where there are no formal establishments.

Since the collection and the committee are personal initiatives of the Pope, the final referents of the project are the Secretariat of State and the Pontifical Council Cor Unum, which can be contacted through the Apostolic Nunciature in Ukraine.

The "technical supervision" of the implementation of the committee's work, however, has been entrusted to Cor Unum.

In an exclusive, sit-down interview with CNA last month, Patriarch Sviatoslav Shevchuk, head of the Ukrainian Greek Catholic Church, said Ukrainians are grateful for the Pope's help and attention to the conflict.

"We are very grateful to the Holy Father for his initiative, first of all to bring attention of the international community to the suffering of Ukrainian citizens in Ukraine."

All Christians, both Catholic and Orthodox, are willing to cooperate with the Pope in his initiative in order to reach the people who are suffering and in need, he said, expressing his gratitude that Francis "is trying to awaken the consciousness of European Christians to that silence about the unjust war against Ukraine." www.catholicnewsagency.com

Thousands of believers march through center of Kyiv for protection of children and families

About five thousand believers together with the clergy held a procession through the center of Kyiv on Saturday, June 4. They did it to participate in the campaign of the All-Ukrainian Council of Churches and Religious Organizations dedicated to Children's Day and family. Along with believers and public figures, the procession was led by the leaders and representatives of all denominations included in the Council.

The procession started from the main entrance of St. Sophia Cathedral, where the audience entertained family songs performed by the band "Noah's Ark". Participants were able to take posters, where the main slogans were: "Children are a blessing of God," "God is the author of family," "The people who kill their children have no future," "Stop Abortion," "Born himself - give birth to others" and so on. The action's purpose was to draw attention to the problems of children's rights to assert in society the principles of love and respect and defend the family as a union of man and woman that meets the God's design and purpose of human nature.

One of the procession participants, Dmytro from Kyiv, has four children. Although he only joined the action only with his medium daughter, it was important for him to come and demonstrate support for family values. "We support the idea of big friendly family, support healthy family," said the man.

The procession held by AUCCRO became symbolic, since the initiative was proposed by the late Archbishop Peter Malchuk of the Roman Catholic Church in Ukraine on 1 March. Therefore this action, which is planned to be held annually, is a tribute to his memory. But some believers doubted as for the appropriateness of selected date —the eve of the Pride parade for representatives of the LGBT community fearing it would trigger a new conflict.

Ms. Tatyana Domashenko of Kyiv even has a small collection of her own poems, which devoted to harmony in the family, the role of men and women, education: "My grandchildren and other relatives also participate. I dream about my family being like the holy family of Nazareth, dream that we all lived amicably."

Not only had the families from Kyiv but from other cities of Ukraine participated in the procession. There were notable representatives of Zhytomyr, Lviv, and a large delegation of the Armenian Church. Spokesman reminded that similar family values that the participants stand for, "is routine for each faithful." Among those present were also Muslims, both from the RAMU and the RAMU "Ummah".

A resident of Kyiv Tatiana, a mother of one daughter, and Helena, mother of two girls, see special symbolism in this action. For Ms. Olena it was important to openly declare her position and support the traditional family. "Today, we have many examples of violence in the family," Tetiana said. "It is important to pay attention to it, build the right foundation for a family. It is nice to see here the organizations where you can go for help, and numerous representatives of the clergy."

The two-hour procession ended with the common prayer and concert with the participation of children in the European square. Heads of religious organizations appealed to all with the requests to pray for family harmony, to maintain peace in word and deed. According to them, the family is the foundation of every state, culture and language of the people, the mainstay of society. Particular attention should be paid for the education of future generations and the role of a father who often cannot seem ideal, but is the support and example for wives and children. The organizers hope that this march will become traditional and will be held in the capital each year.

Reconciliation: on Sundays and Holy Days: before Liturgies and other days, by appointment.

Holy Communion: for the sick, by appointment, any time. **Baptisms**: by appointment. **Marriages**: please make an appointment to meet with the parish priest. **Funerals and Memorials**: by appointment. **Holy Unction** (Anointing of the Sick): Those anticipating surgery, hospitalization or treatments and who would like to receive anointing, please contact Fr. Pavlo to arrange a time.

Basic Guidelines for Reception of Holy Communion:

You are a member of the Catholic Church (Orthodox faithful are welcome to receive Holy Communion); 2) You have participated in the Sacrament of Confession at least during the Easter or Christmas seasons this past year if not more frequently; 3) You attend Divine Services regularly; 4) Your lifestyle is consistent with the teaching of the Catholic Church; 5) You have kept the Liturgical fast – no food at least one hour prior to the Divine Liturgy (water and medicine does not break the fast). 6) You have been in church from the beginning of the service, or at least heard the Gospel. 7) To the best of your ability, you are in the state of Grace.

If for any of these or other reasons you cannot receive Holy Communion, you are very welcome to come for a blessing. Please indicate to the priest that you would like to receive his blessing.

Bequests and Wills: Leaving a bequest is a process of giving a donation through your will. It is simply a distribution from your estate to a charitable organization through your last will and testament. It can be as small or as large a donation as you wish. It is important that you talk to your lawyer about the process.
