share in the divine life, so that Your Name, O Saviour, may be praised, together with Your eternal Father, and Your most-holy, good and life-giving Spirit. Amen.

"We do not know how clearly the young man in the Gospel understood the profound and challenging import of Jesus' first reply: "If you wish to enter into life, keep the commandments". But it is certain that the young man's commitment to respect all the moral demands of the commandments represents the absolutely essential ground in which the desire for perfection can take root and mature, the desire, that is, for the meaning of the commandments to be completely fulfilled in following Christ. Jesus' conversation with the young man helps us to grasp *the conditions for the moral growth of man, who has been called to perfection:* the young man, having observed all the commandments, shows that he is incapable of taking the next step by himself alone. To do so requires mature human freedom ("If you wish to be perfect") and God's gift of grace ("Come, follow me").

Perfection demands that maturity in self-giving to which human freedom is called. Jesus points out to the young man that the commandments are the first and indispensable condition for having eternal life; on the other hand, for the young man to give up all he possesses and to follow the Lord is presented as an invitation: "If you wish...". These words of Jesus reveal the particular dynamic of freedom's growth towards maturity, and at the same time *they bear witness to the fundamental relationship between freedom and divine law.* Human freedom and God's law are not in opposition; on the contrary, they appeal one to the other. The follower of Christ knows that his vocation is to freedom. "You were called to freedom, brethren" (*Gal* 5:13), proclaims the Apostle Paul with joy and pride. But he immediately adds: "only do not use your freedom as an opportunity for the flesh, but through love be servants of one another" (ibid.). The firmness with which the Apostle opposes those who believe that they are justified by the Law has nothing to do with man's "liberation" from precepts. On the contrary, the latter are at the service of the practice of love: "For he who loves his neighbour has fulfilled the Law. The commandments, 'You shall not commit adultery; You shall not murder; You shall not steal; You shall not covet,' and any other commandment, are summed up in this sentence, 'You shall love your neighbour as yourself' "(Rom 13:8-9).

Saint Augustine, after speaking of the observance of the commandments as being a kind of incipient, imperfect freedom, goes on to say: "Why, someone will ask, is it not yet perfect? Because 'I see in my members another law at war with the law of my reason'... In part freedom, in part slavery: not yet complete freedom, not yet pure, not yet whole, because we are not yet in eternity. In part we retain our weakness and in part we have attained freedom. All our sins were destroyed in Baptism, but does it follow that no weakness remained after iniquity was destroyed? Had none remained, we would live without sin in this life. But who would dare to say this except someone who is proud, someone unworthy of the mercy of our deliverer?... Therefore, since some weakness has remained in us, I dare to say that to the extent to which we serve God we are free, while to the extent that we follow the law of sin, we are still slaves". - Saint Pope John-Paul II^{ND's} Encyclical Letter "Veritatis Splendor, 17"/"The Splendor of the Truth"

The blessing of homes constitutes an invocative blessing, meaning that by his prayer and by the sprinkling of Holy Water the priest invokes God's blessings and protection upon the home and those living in it.

We bless homes for many reasons: *†* to reveal the home as what God had created it to be, a way to Heaven *†* to rid the home of every evil *†* to show that the family is a small Church unit in Christ *†* to consecrate

the home and all activity in it to God \dagger to fill the home and all who live in it with the fullness of God.

Traditionally, the priest personally visits all his parishioners each year to pray with them in the place where they live, and to bless their surroundings with the newly sanctified water of Theophany. By sanctifying our homes we extend the grace of God to our individual dwellings.

Just as our souls, so also our homes become tainted by the sins of those living in them and consequently lose God's protective power. We cleanse our souls of sins at least once a year and the church is blessed with the newly blessed water every year, so should our homes be sanctified with Holy Water to invoke God's blessings and protection on it and its inhabitants. As we renew the insurance on our home every year, so we should renew our insurance of God's protection and His blessing which is of greater importance and more What should we do during a home blessing? As we welcome our priest during the holy season of Theophany to bless our effective. home, let us be mindful that he is bringing to us the "blessing of the Jordan," and that unless God protects and blesses our home, we "labour in vain." (Ps. 127:1)

Each family is considered a small church and the family table is the home altar. When the priest comes, have as many family members there as possible. If you do not have an icon corner, ensure that you set up a place for prayer either at the kitchen or dining table. On the table include an icon and a lit candle. You may also include anything that you may want to have blessed (i.e. icon, cross, personal item, etc.) Make sure that the lights are on in every room. The priest will begin the blessing at the icon corner or table. If you have children, they may lead the priest, while holding a candle, to each room in the house. This is also a wonderful time for you and your priest to visit and to get to know each other better.

West Coast welcomes Mother Teresa's postulator for upcoming events

One of the defining celebrations of the 2016 Jubilee Year of Mercy was the canonization of Mother Teresa. Beloved around the world by believers and non-believers alike, her relentless care for the poor and abandoned struck the heart of humanity. Her story continues to spread through the ministry of her postulator, Fr. Brian Kolodiejchuk, MC, a Canadian who will be travelling to Victoria, Vancouver, and Kelowna January 14-16 to present on Mother's life and legacy. The events will be hosted by the Ukrainian Eparchial Bishop of New Westminster, B.C., Kenneth Nowakowski. Salt and Light recently interviewed Bishop Nowakowski about the event and the interest of many people in Mother Teresa's life.

S+L: When and how did the idea for this event come about?

+Nowakowski: Shortly after I became the Ukrainian Catholic Bishop of New Westminster (July 2007), I had hoped to bring Fr. Brian to the Eparchy either to preach a retreat for our clergy or missions in our parishes. However, when I contacted him he was just elected the Superior General for the men's Missionaries of Charity and was unavailable but said he would keep my request in mind. The years seemed to go by very quickly. Then it was announced that Blessed Mother Teresa would be canonized and so I phoned him and asked him



if he would consider coming to the Eparchy and give a few presentations in our parishes in the Vancouver area and in Victoria and Kelowna in the early part of 2017. He agreed and when we saw each other at the Toronto Supreme Convention of the Knights of Columbus at the beginning of August this year we began to work on the plan.

S+L: Mother Teresa was born in Albania, but spent most of her life in India. Fr. Brian, her postulator who's headlining your events, is a Canadian-born Ukrainian Catholic priest. Is there a special appreciation for Mother Teresa among Ukrainian Greco-Catholics?

+Nowakowski: I think that the appeal of Mother Teresa is very universal. Certainly the Missionaries of Charity Sisters are well known in Ukraine and her message is one that has touched the hearts of people all over the world including Ukrainian Catholics in Canada.

S+L: Why do you think the figure of Mother Teresa and her service to the poor is appealing to so many people in the church, and outside the church today?

+Nowakowski: Mother Teresa dared to do what most of us would not even think of, and that is to see Jesus in such misery and pain. Her words and her actions brought attention to world leaders, to Christians, and to non-believers. She brought out the good in people. Even if it was not your vocation to live like her, I think people who came to know of her and her work did and do find ways to live her spirit in the best ways they can. She was not just a good social worker, because what she did was to see Jesus in the people she served and this gave her the graces to touch not only the lonely and dying but all of us.

S+L: Mother Teresa was canonized during the Jubilee Year of Mercy. What significance do you--as a bishop in Canada--see in this? +Nowakowski: Mercy is given by people who are in a position to give mercy to others. The Jubilee Year of Mercy helped us to be reminded of not only the mercy shown to us by Jesus but also how we are called to be merciful to others. Mother

reminded of not only the mercy shown to us by Jesus but also how we are called to be merciful to others. Mother Teresa's canonization during the special Jubilee Year by His Holiness Pope Francis underlined how ordinary people from the most humble states of life can be instruments of Mercy. As a Catholic Bishop in Canada, her example has helped me illustrate my homilies this past year. S+L: What do you hope the people who attend the event experience and take away?

+**Nowakowski:** Fr. Brian is a very dynamic speaker. He immediately brings his gentle nature of kindness and the spirit when he talks about Mother Teresa because of his close relationship with her. Not all of us have had an experience to know this saintly woman and so I hope that through Fr. Brian people can experience her love, her message and what it means for us here today and now.

S+L: How can people register for the events?

+Nowakowski: The best way is to phone: Deacon Mykhailo (Micheal) at our Chancery: 604-524-8824 and let him know that they would like to attend and specify which venue, either at our parish in Victoria on Saturday 14 January in the afternoon, or on Sunday 15 January in the afternoon in Vancouver or on Monday 16 January in the early evening in Kelowna. We are asking for a contribution of \$50.00 per person. The funds raised will assist us in the costs of bringing Fr. Brian to British Columbia, allow us to make a donation to Fr. Ternopil (Ukraine) amateur gives second life to rundown churches

Ternopil resident Volodymyr Krisa is systematically engaged in revival of sacral architecture monuments. The craftsman has also made architectural models, recreating the original appearance of the temples that have survived altered, and his plans include the creation of a museum of architectural models.

A 32-year-old man is not an architect by profession. He works as an engineer in the Internet provider company. He got involved in restoration in 2011as a hobby. And this activity almost immediately grew into something bigger. In December 2016 - January 2017, the works of Krisawill be presented at the exhibition in Ternopil regional museum, which opened on St. Nicholas Day, December 19th.

"At first I reproduced thearchitectural models by layouts found on the Internet. Everyone can find, print out and reproduce them. But much more interesting isproducing themodels from beginning to end. It is hard work that requires analysis of all available material about the structure, independent production of drawings," says Volodymyr Krisa.

It is in this way - through knowledge of history, he recreated the temples of Ternopil:the Dominican church - the presentArchcathedral of the UGCC, NadstavnaChurch of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross, Jesuit and parish churches, the old synagogue. This is the basis of Volodymyr Krisa's collection. The craftsman uses cardboard, fiberboard, paper, wood as materials.

"First I created architectural models of Cologne Cathedral, Sagrada Familia in Barcelona, St. Basil church in Moscow, St. Michael Church in Hamburg based on the ready layouts. In January-March 2015,I madethe first construction layout of a derelict church," Volodymyr Krisarecalls. "In January-June 2015,I made amodel of the archcathedral. But I amworking only in my spare time. To sum itup, the whole project lasts about a month. Recently I have completed the Jesuit church architectural model - I worked on it throughout October-November 2016."

The architectural model of Ternopil parish church of 1904-1908 made by Volodymyr Krisa. The temple was destroyed in 1954 with explosives.

Now Volodymyr Krisa is working on the layout of the Medium Church –this is how the residents of Ternopil have called the Church of the Nativity of early XVII, located in the city center.

"I plan to create a park full of architectural models. I am not only interested in the architecture of Ternopil, Ukraine and all. I think this park will be interesting for tourists –the craftsman continues. "But I need time to implement the plan and I lack it so far. Of course, it would be nice if there were a partner ready to cooperate in this area."

By the way, Volodymyr Krisawas an active participant of another symbolic project – the creation of a bronze model of Ternopil in 2015-2016, which was installed this year near the Archcathedral. If for any of these or other reasons you cannot receive Holy Communion, you are very welcome to come for a blessing. Please indicate to the priest that you would like to receive his blessing.

Bequests and Wills: Leaving a bequest is a process of giving a donation through your will. It is simply a distribution from your estate to a charitable organization through your last will and testament. It can be as small or as large a donation as you wish.
