

The blessing of homes constitutes an invocative blessing, meaning that by his prayer and by the sprinkling of Holy Water the priest invokes God's blessings and protection upon the home and those living in it.

We bless homes for many reasons: † to reveal the home as what God had created it to be, a way to Heaven † to rid the home of every evil † to show that the family is a small Church unit in Christ † to consecrate the home and all activity in it to God † to fill the home and all who live in it with the fullness of God.

Traditionally, the priest personally visits all his parishioners each year to pray with them in the place where they live, and to bless their surroundings with the newly sanctified water of Theophany. By sanctifying our homes we extend the grace of God to our individual dwellings.

Just as our souls, so also our homes become tainted by the sins of those living in them and consequently lose God's protective power. We cleanse our souls of sins at least once a year and the church is blessed with the newly blessed water every year, so should our homes be sanctified with Holy Water to invoke God's blessings and protection on it and its inhabitants. As we renew the insurance on our home every year, so we should renew our insurance of God's protection and His blessing which is of greater importance and more effective. What should we do during a home blessing? As we welcome our priest during the holy season of Theophany to bless our home, let us be mindful that he is bringing to us the "blessing of the Jordan," and that unless God protects and blesses our home, we "labour in vain." (Ps. 127:1)

Each family is considered a small church and the family table is the home altar. When the priest comes, have as many family members there as possible. If you do not have an icon corner, ensure that you set up a place for prayer either at the kitchen or dining table. On the table include an icon and a lit candle. You may also include anything that you may want to have blessed (i.e. icon, cross, personal item, etc.) Make sure that the lights are on in every room. The priest will begin the blessing at the icon corner or




table. If you have children, they may lead the priest, while holding a candle, to each room in the house. This is also a wonderful time for you and your priest to visit and to get to know each other better.

Pope Francis reflected on Thursday how each person, not knowing what will happen in the future, has only "today" to love God and open their heart to the Holy Spirit – while the temptation to put things off is foolish, because there may not be another day.

"I do not say this in order to scare you, but simply to say that our life is the present moment: today or never," he said Jan. 12. "I think upon this. Tomorrow will be the eternal tomorrow, without sunset, with the Lord, forever. If I am faithful to this moment."

In his homily at Mass, Pope Francis reflected on the day's first reading, which comes from the Letter to the Hebrews and says, "Oh, that today you would hear his voice, 'harden not your hearts..." (Heb. 3:15) And a few lines later: "Encourage yourselves

daily while it is still 'today,' so that none of you may grow hardened by the deceit of sin." (Heb. 3:13)

As this passage points out, the Pope said, it is "a present moment in which we have received the love of God, God's promise to find him." Therefore, he said, even though it is tempting to say, "I will do it tomorrow," it is possible that tomorrow simply "will not be."

Francis illustrated his point using two of Jesus' parables: The 10 foolish virgins who did not have oil for their lamps, so when they returned, found the door closed to them, and the man who knocked at the door, but to whom the Lord said, "I do not know you: you arrived late."

It is "only this day in our life," he emphasized, "the present moment," that we are able to renew "our alliance with God's fidelity." If you struggle with this, one thing you can do is ask the Holy Spirit directly for help, the Pope said, simply praying: "How do I live, this moment?" It is also important to cultivate a heart that is open to the Lord, one that has faith and is not caught in the snare of sin, he said.

The present moment is played out in our hearts, he said, since it is there that we are able to truly encounter God and have a relationship with him.

The Pope said it always strikes him when an elderly person, many times a priest or a sister, asks him to pray for them in their "final perseverance" before death. He responds to them, he said, saying, "But, you have lived your whole life well, all the moments of your day are in the service of the Lord, but you have fear...?"

No, they respond, they are not afraid, but they know that "even now my life is not set: I wish to live it fully, to pray that the moment arrives full, full, with the heart steadfast in the faith, and not ruined from sin, from vices, from corruption..."

For ourselves then, he said, we must search our hearts, asking ourselves the questions: "how does it go, my present moment, in the presence of the Lord? And my heart, how is it? Is it open? Is it solid in the faith?" Does it leave space for "the Lord's love?" With these questions, he said, "we ask the Lord for the grace of which every one of us has need."

## 8 Things Catholics Should Do Every Day

- 1. **Start the day with prayer, your Bible, and a talk with your Mother** It sounds so simple, yet I don't understand why some days I can't seem to "fit" in prayer. **Our days need to be centered around this habit.** Make a date of it. Set your cell phone alarm to a time when you can pray and don't leave God stranded. Mornings are best, but if it doesn't work for you find a time that does. Pull out your Bible and read a line or two. The daily Mass readings are a great place to start. A goal for every Catholic is to say the rosary every day, but some of us are in a season of life when this isn't possible. If you can't do a rosary, start with at least a Hail Mary and work up to a decade or a chaplet. "Prayer is nothing else than union with God. When the heart is pure and united with God it is consoled and filled with sweetness; it is dazzled by a marvelous light." Saint John Vianney
- 2. **Smile, Use your Manners, Be kind, Give out hugs**. Have you heard the old Hymn, "They will know we are Christians by our love, by our love..."? It's not necessarily true today. Christians have become just as rude and inconsiderate as everyone else, sometimes even more so! Let's reclaim our Christian love by smiling, letting others go first in line or helping old ladies cross the street. "Let us always meet each other with smile, for the smile is the beginning of love." Saint Mother Teresa of Calcutta
- 3. **Go on Social Media (i.e.,** *communicate*!), call a friend, visit a friend. Yes, I know we have a bunch of posts about how social media is overused, but go ahead, use it! However, use it in a way that glorifies God. Share a scripture with a friend. Check in on an old classmate. Daily connect with people to build relationships. (Don't stop there though; make it a weekly goal to get together in person with a friend or family member.) "Friendship is the source of the greatest pleasures, and without friends even the most agreeable pursuits become tedious." Saint Thomas Aquinas
- 4. **Tell someone you love them and why**. I don't know anyone who has ever gotten tired of hearing they are loved. It's even better when they are given a list of reasons why! Whether it is your parents, siblings, or your own children, make it a daily habit to tell at least one person in your life how much you love them. "You learn to speak by speaking, to study by studying, to run by running, to work by working, and just so, you learn to love by loving. All those who think to learn in any other way deceive themselves." Saint Francis de Sales
- 5. **Talk about God**. Make God a part of your whole day, not just your prayer time. Bring Him into conversations with friends, family, even co-workers if you can. We talk about things we love movies, restaurants, people... but we often fail to talk about God in the same way. "But this does not mean that we should postpone the evangelizing mission; rather, each of us should find ways to communicate Jesus wherever we are. All of us are called to offer others an explicit witness to the saving love of the Lord, who despite our imperfections offers us his closeness, his word and his strength, and gives meaning to our lives." Pope Francis
- 6. **Sacrifice something**. It's so important that we learn to make daily sacrifices and offer them up to the Lord. It doesn't have to be anything crazy. Eat bread with no butter. Turn off the radio and drive in silence. It's the little things that cultivate our holiness and help us to overcome our attachment to things of the world. "There is no place for selfishness—and no place for fear! Do not be afraid, then, when love makes demands. Do not be afraid when love requires sacrifice." Saint Pope John Paul II
- 7. **Serve in some way**. Look for a way to serve someone every day. Again, this doesn't have to be something major like heading to Africa on service trip. It can be doing the dishes for your mom, paying for a stranger's coffee, or picking

up garbage as you walk down the street. **Don't let a day go by in which you did not do something for someone else.** "You know that our Lord does not look at the greatness or difficulty of our action, but at the love with which you do it. What, then, have you to fear?" – Saint Therese of the Child Jesus

8. **Reflect on your day**. At the end of every day, take a few minutes to think back over the day. An examination of conscience is a great way to do this. Is there someone you need to forgive? Is there someone you need to seek forgiveness from? Think about the ways in which the Lord provided for you and be thankful for His many blessings. Thank Him! Ask yourself, did I move closer to or further from God through my actions today? How can I do better tomorrow? There is even an app for this created by a priest. Check out the EXAMEN Prayer App here: http://www.theprodigalfather.org. "You must strive with all possible care to please God in such a manner as neither to do nor behold anything, without first consulting Him, and in everything to seek Him alone and His glory." – Saint Alphonsus Rodriguez

For your weekly and monthly planning: Every Week: go to Mass on Sunday (and more frequently if you can through the week); go to Adoration; meet with a friend in person and/or go on a date with your spouse; tithe.

**Every Month**: go to Confession; do some type of ministry (help with a youth group, serve in a soup kitchen, etc.); read a spiritual book; meet with a spiritual mentor. **Every Year**: Go on a Retreat.

These things are just a starting point. What else can and should we be doing to live a life of holiness here on earth?

\* Please, contact Fr. Pavlo if you want to have the Divine Liturgies celebrated in your special (such as: In thanksgiving for favours received, the Infirm, General Intentions, the Deceased, Help of the Holy Spirit, for the Travelers, etc.) intentions.

Pastoral Ministry and Sacraments: Reconciliation: on Sundays and Holy Days: before Liturgies and other days, by appointment.

Holy Communion: for the sick, by appointment, any time. Baptisms: by appointment. Marriages: six months' notice should be given to the parish priest, and he should be contacted before any other arrangements are made. Funerals and Memorials: by appointment. Holy Unction (Anointing of the Sick): Those anticipating surgery, hospitalization or treatments and who would like to receive anointing or to meet with parish priest, please call or email Fr. Pavlo in advance to arrange a time and a day.

- \*Basic Guidelines for Reception of Holy Communion: You are a member of the Catholic Church (Orthodox faithful are welcome to receive Holy Communion); 2) You have participated in the Sacrament of Confession at least during the Easter or Christmas seasons this past year if not more frequently; 3) You attend Divine Services regularly; 4) Your lifestyle is consistent with the teaching of the Catholic Church; 5) You have kept the Liturgical fast no food at least one hour prior to the Divine Liturgy (water and medicine does not break the fast). 6) You have been in church from the beginning of the service, or at least heard the Gospel. 7) To the best of your ability, you are in the state of Grace. If for any of these or other reasons you cannot receive Holy Communion, you are very welcome to come for a blessing. Please indicate to the priest that you would like to receive his blessing.
- \* Bequests and Wills: Leaving a bequest is a process of giving a donation through your will. It is simply a distribution from your estate to a charitable organization through your last will and testament. It can be as small or as large a donation as you wish. It is important that you talk to your lawyer about the process. In your kindness please remember The Most Holy Trinity Ukrainian Catholic Church in Kamloops, BC in your bequests and wills. If anyone wishes to make such a bequest in their will, the following clause may be included or added to a will: "I give, devise, and bequeath to The Most Holy Trinity Ukrainian Catholic Church at 109 Tranquille Road, Kamloops, BC V3B 3E8 the sum of \$\_\_\_\_ (or \_\_\_\_% of my estate), to be used for the benefit of the church/parish, it's needs and pastoral ministry."
