Spirit – Pastoral Letter of His Beatitude Sviatoslav

O Lord Jesus Christ, our Good Shepherd, as you once gathered lost sheep that they might hear Your voice and be your flock, so also today graciously look down from heaven upon our parish community, and send down on it your Holy Spirit, that it might be a place to receive the joy of Your Good News. Strengthen us with your presence, and always gather us together in prayer. Grant us the spirit of serving others, so that in our parish all might encounter You, the merciful God. Bless our spiritual leaders with Your wisdom, and inspire us to generously give of our time, talents and treasure for the building up of Your Kingdom. Unite us in peace and harmony, as befits Your community of love. Instill in us a missionary spirit, and let our parish community shine with the light of the Gospel, with prayer and good works, inviting all to share in the divine life, so that Your Name, O Saviour, may be praised, together with Your eternal Father, and Your most-holy, good and life-giving Spirit. Amen.

What exactly, then, is the reason for fasting? One answer might lie in the story of a wealthy businessman who went to retreat at a distant monastery. His journey to

the monastery was a sincere one; it was a journey in which he wished to grow closer to God. When he arrived at the monastery, he was warmly greeted. Later, he was brought before the abbot of the monastery to seek spiritual direction. While in the presence of the abbot, the abbot asked the man if he would like a glass of water. When the man responded with a "yes", the abbot began to pour him some water. The abbot poured and poured until the water reached the very tip of the glass; but he didn't stop! Instead, he kept pouring and pouring so that the water overflowed the rim of the glass; ran onto the table; and drenched the expensive suit which the man was wearing. Jumping up in a frenzy, the man yelled at the abbot,

"What are you doing? Look at what you did to my suit!" Turning to the man, the abbot said, "You are like this glass of water. You are so full of concerns—concerns for riches and other anxieties of the world. You are completely full. There is no space for you to hold anything else inside. There is no room for God to come in. Before God can come in, you must empty yourself and make room for Him to enter."

The reason for fasting, then, is precisely this: Fasting is a way of emptying ourselves from the cares and concerns of this world—A means of preparation and conditioning, which will enable us serve God and grow closer to Him.

The Great Fast/Lent is a time when we are preparing to celebrate the saving event of Christ's death and rising, which has reopened Paradise to us once more (Luke 23:43). So sorrow for our exile in sin is tempered by hope of our re-entry into Paradise.

The theme of forgiveness, is emphasized in the Gospel reading for this Sunday (Matthew 6:14-21) and in the special ceremony of mutual forgiveness at the end of the Vespers on Sunday evening. Before we enter the Lenten fast, we are reminded that there can be no true fast, no genuine repentance, no reconciliation with God, unless we are at the same time reconciled with one another. We do not travel the road of the Great Fast/Lent as isolated individuals but as members of a family. Our asceticism and fasting should not separate us from others, but should link us to them with ever-stronger bonds.

Verse: In Judea God is known: His name is great in Israel. (Ps 75.2)



The night is far spent; the day draws near. Let us cast off deeds of darkness and put on the armor of light. Let us live honorably as in daylight; not in carousing and drunkenness, not in sexual excess and lust, not in quarreling and jealousy. Rather, put on the Lord Jesus Christ and make no provision for the desires of the flesh.

Extend a kind welcome to those who are weak in faith. Do not enter into disputes with them. A man of sound faith knows he can eat anything, while one who is weak in faith eats



Alleluia (Tone 8): Come, let us rejoice in the Lord; let us acclaim God our Saviour (Ps 94:1). Let us come before His countenance with praise and acclaim Him with psalms (Ps 94:2).

Gospel: (Matthew 6:14-21)

The Lord said: "If you forgive the faults of others, your heavenly Father will forgive you yours. If you do not forgive others, neither will your Father forgive you.

When you fast, you are not to look glum as the hypocrites do. They change the appearance of their faces so that others may see they are fasting. I assure you, they are already repaid.

When you fast, see to it that you groom your hair and wash you face. In that way no one can see you are fasting but your Father who is hidden; and your Father who sees what is hidden will repay you.

Do not lay up for yourselves an earthly treasure. Moths and rust corrode; thieves break in and steal. Make it your practice instead to store up heavenly treasure, which neither moths nor rust corrode nor thieves break in and steal. Remember, where your treasure is, there your heart is also."

Communion Verse: Praise the Lord from the heavens; praise Him in the highest (Ps 148:1). Alleluia! (x3)



Maltese bishops: Remarried Catholics 'at peace' can receive Communion

In guidelines for the application of Pope Francis's "Amoris Laetitia", the bishops of Malta say that divorced and civilly remarried Catholics who, with "an informed and enlightened conscience," believe they're at peace with God, "cannot be precluded from participating in the sacraments."

ROME- Bishops in the island nation of Malta, in percentage terms among the most Catholic nations on earth, have followed those of Buenos Aires, the pontiff's home archdiocese, in their approach to Pope Francis's document on the family, *Amoris Laetitia*. Like their Latin American peers, they've produced a set of guidelines that clearly state the door to Communion for divorced and civilly remarried Catholics is open.

"If, as a result of the process of discernment," the bishops write, "a separated or divorced person who is living in a new relationship manages, with an informed and enlightened conscience, to acknowledge and believe that he or she is at peace with God, he or she cannot be precluded from participating in the sacraments of Reconciliation and the Eucharist." Meaning, if a person, in good conscience, believes he or she is entitled to Communion, priests in Malta can't exclude them from accessing the sacrament.

The Maltese "Criteria for the Application of Chapter VIII of 'Amoris Laetitia'" was signed on January 8 by Archbishop Charles Scicluna of Malta and Bishop Mario Grech of Gozo. Released on Jan. 13 through the bishops' website, the document sent to the country's priests included a copy of the divisive chapter at the end. In their guidelines the bishops write that when a priest meets persons who find themselves in "irregular" situations, he must "enter in dialogue with them and to come to know them in a spirit of authentic charity."

"If, subsequently, they show a genuine desire or accept to engage in a serious process of personal discernment about their situation, we should accompany them willingly on this journey, with true respect, care and attention," they write. Catholics who are in these situations, the document continues, quoting *Amoris*, "should be made to feel part of the Church" because "They're not excommunicated."

Throughout this process of accompanying a person who's discerning his or her situation, the role of a priest-or bishop- is not that of "granting permission for these people to receive the sacraments, or to offer 'easy recipes,' or to substitute their conscience. Our role is patiently to help them to form and enlighten their own conscience, in order that they themselves may be able to make an honest decision before God."

The first step in this process, Scicluna and Grech write, always must be to affirm church teaching on the indissolubility of marriage. Then, the couple's specific situation should be examined to determine if their first union was a valid marriage and if reasonable doubt arises, they should be encouraged to request a declaration of nullity. "While exercising our ministry, we must be

careful to avoid falling into extremes: into extreme rigor on the one hand, and laxity on the other," the guidelines say. "This process should be an invitation to harness certain attitudes, such as pastoral charity, honesty, discretion, an ongoing conversion, and love for the Church and her teaching."

The prelates close their criteria acknowledging that they, as Pope Francis, know that there are some who prefer a "more rigorous pastoral care." Yet, once again quoting Francis's document, the Maltese bishops say they believe "Jesus wants a Church attentive to the goodness which the Holy Spirit sows in the midst of human weakness, a Mother who, while clearly expressing her objective teaching, 'always does what good she can, even if in the process, her shoes get soiled by the mud of the street'."

Though the two prelates didn't get a letter from Francis commending their approach, as the Argentines did, the Maltese guidelines were published on Friday by the Vatican's newspaper of record, *L'Osservatore Romano*, signaling that they have Rome's approval. As most diocesan guidelines do so far, the document solely addresses Chapter VIII, which focuses on couples in irregular situations.

The bishops who produce the guidelines for the application of *Amoris Laetitia* do so following Francis's request. However, interpretations have varied, with many prelates saying that the document opens the door to Communion for couples who are civilly remarried and others saying that it doesn't, arguing that doing so contradicts the Church's teaching and tradition.

South African Cardinal Wilfred Napier, an avid Twitter user, has been sharing passages of the document and reflections, generally supportive of the apostolic exhortation as a whole. On January 5th, however, he asked if "The faith taught by the missionaries e.g. that polygamy is morally wrong because Scripture teaches one man one wife for life, completely wrong?"

Scicluna, who was sent back to Malta by Francis after a 17-year run in the Vatican's Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith, previously worked as Promoter of Justice under Cardinal Joseph Ratzinger, who kept him there when he became Pope Benedict XVI. An expert in canon law, he was credited with constructing the 2010 universal norms that extended the Church's statutes of limitations on reporting cases of sexual abuse.

If for any of these or other reasons you cannot receive Holy Communion, you are very welcome to come for a blessing. Please indicate to the priest that you would like to receive his blessing.
