On this Sunday the most wonderful healing of the paralytic by the Sheep's Pool, who for 38 years languished in severe illness is glorified.

Saint John Chrysostom (+407A.D.) says in a sermon on todays' Gospel: "Having lately come across the incident of the paralytic who lay upon his bed beside the pool, we discovered a rich and large treasure, not be delving in the ground, but by diving into his heart: we found a treasure not containing silver and gold and precious stones, but endurance, and philosophy, and patience and much hope towards God, which is more valuable than any kind of jewel or source of wealth."

(Christ's Power to Heal: The Paralytic, p.2)

This saint of the Catholic Church, like many of the other fathers of the Catholic Church in the orthodox faith and teaching, praises the paralytic for his patient persevering in the face of prolonged suffering. Perhaps it is true at that time that there were actually few cures for diseases and patiently enduring suffering was seen as heroic and godly since there was no alternative. It is more difficult for us today to be patient in the face of suffering as we want immediate cures or at least instant relief from suffering and we don't appreciate the Stoicism embraced by the ancient Christians that a man of perfection is already beyond caring about pleasure or pain.

Liturgical Propers:

Text from "The Divine Liturgy: An Anthology for Worship"; Pg. 501. The Divine Liturgy of St. John Chrysostom Liturgical Instruction: After the priest exclaims "Blessed is the Kingdom" and we have responded "Amen," the clergy sing the following Troparion once and the people repeat it. Then the clergy sing the first half, and we conclude it. This is done every day until the Wednesday before Ascension Thursday.

Troparion: Christ is risen from the dead, conquering death by death, and to those in the tombs He granted life. (3x)

Troparion (Tone 3): Let the heavens be glad, let the earth rejoice, for the Lord has done a mighty deed with his arm. He trampled death by death; He became the first born of the dead; He saved us from the abyss of Hades and granted great mercy to the world.

Glory be to the Father and to the Son and to the Holy Spirit.

Kontakion (Tone 3): Lord, as of old You raised the Paralytic, lift my soul by Your divine presence, for by my many sins and foolish actions, I, too, am now afflicted and crippled. Raise me, that being saved I may cry to You: Glory to Your power, O merciful Christ.

Now and for ever and ever. Amen.

Kontakion (Tone 8): Though You descended into a tomb, O Immortal One, yet You destroyed the power of Hades; and You rose as victor, O Christ God, calling to the myrrh-bearing women: Rejoice! and giving peace to Your apostles: You, who grant Resurrection to the fallen.

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles': (Acts 9:32-42)

In those days, when Peter was making numerous journeys, he went – among the other places – to God's holy people living in Lydda. There he found a man named Aeneas, a paralytic who had been bedridden for eight years. Peter said to him, "Aeneas, Jesus Christ cures you! Get up and make your bed." The man got up at once. All the inhabitants of Lydda and Sharon, upon seeing him, were converted to the Lord.

Now in Joppa there was a certain woman convert named Tabitha (in Greek Dorcas, meaning a gazelle). Her life was marked by constant good deeds and acts of charity. At about that time she fell ill and died. They washed her body and laid it out in an upstairs room. Since Lydda was near Joppa, the disciples who had heard that Peter was there sent two men to him with the urgent request, "Please come over to us without delay." Peter set out with them as they asked. Upon his arrival they took him upstairs to the room. All the widows came to him in tears and showed him the various garments Dorcas had made when she was still with them. Peter first made everyone go outside; then he knelt down and prayed. Turning to the dead body, he said, "Tabitha, stand up." She opened her eyes, then looked at Peter and sat up. He gave her his hand and helped her to her feet. The next thing

he did was to call in those who were believers and the widows to show them all that she was alive. This became known all over Joppa, and because of it, many came to believe in the Lord.

Alleluia (Tone 5): Of Your mercies, O Lord, I will sing forever; with my mouth I will proclaim Your truth from generation to generation (Ps 88:2). For You have said, "Mercy will be established forever" (Ps 88:3).



Gospel: (*John 5:1-15*)

At that time Jesus went up to Jerusalem. Now in Jerusalem by the Sheep Pool there is a place with the Hebrew name Bethesda. It is five porticoes. Were crowded with sick people lying there blind, lame or disabled (waiting for the movement of the water).

There was one man who had been sick for thirty-eight years. Jesus, who knew he had been sick for long time, said when he saw him lying there, "Do you want to be healed?" "Sir," the sick man answered, "I do not have anyone to plunge me into the pool once the water has been stirred up. By the time I get there, someone else has gone in ahead of me." Jesus said to him, "Stand up! Pick up your mat and walk!" The man was immediately cured; he picked up his mat and began to walk. The day was a Sabbath.

Consequently, some of the Jews began telling the man who had been cured, "It is the Sabbath, and you are not allowed to carry that mat around." He explained: "It was the man who cured me who told me, 'Pick up your mat and walk." "This person who told you to pick it up and walk," they asked, "who is he?" The man who had been restored to health had no idea who it was. The crowd in that place was so great that Jesus had been able to slip away. Later on, Jesus found him in the temple precincts and said to him: "Remember, now, you have been cured. Give up your sins so that something worse may not overtake you." The man went off and informed the Jews that Jesus was the one who had cured him.

Pope Francis: many young people in the Church have fallen into the 'temptation of rigidity'

The Pontiff criticised 'rigid' Christians who lack mercy, and those who are hypocritical and hide their sinfulness

Pray that those who are too rigid learn to follow the way of Christ and his meekness, Pope Francis said on May 5 during his early morning Mass in the chapel of his residence, the Domus Sanctae Marthae.

With the day's first reading dedicated to the conversion of Saul — who went from fiercely persecuting Christians to patiently evangelising all peoples — the Pope used St Paul's life story as an example of an honest, idealistic person of faith, who had been "convinced" of the rigidity of the law.

Pope Francis said Saul's early life reminds him of "many young people in the church today who have fallen into the temptation of rigidity. Some are honest, they are good and we must pray that the Lord help them grow along the path of meekness."

Others, the Pope said, use rigidity to cover up their weaknesses, sins and personality disorders and to assert themselves over others.

"They are the rigid with the double life. They show themselves as beautiful, honest, but when no one is looking, they do bad things," he said.

Saul, on the other hand, was rigid, but honest, the Pope said, and he let himself be led by the Lord, who spoke to him on the road to Damascus with "a language of meekness: 'Saul, Saul, why are you persecuting me?'"

Saul was called with "the force of the meekness of the Lord" to become Paul, preach the Gospel and suffer and die for the Lord, the Pope said.

Saul's conversion shows dialogue between condescending rigidity and meekness, a dialogue between "an honest man and Jesus who speaks with kindness."

"This is the path of a Christian: going forward following Jesus' footsteps," which is "a trail of preaching, a trail of suffering, the trail of the cross" and resurrection, the Pope said.

The Pope asked people to pray to Saul for those Christians who are rigid — "for the honest-rigid like him, who have zeal, but get it wrong, and for the hypocrite-rigid, those with a double life." UGCC Head outlines four steps to Russian-Ukrainian reconciliation

His Beatitude Sviatoslav (Shevchuk) Head of the UGCC said that currently Ukrainian reconciliation with the Russians is impossible because of the war. But talking about peace, seeking for it, praying is never too early.

The hierarch expressed this opinion in the interactive program OPEN CHURCH of Zhyve TV. the Information Department of the UGCC has reported.

"When it comes to reconciliation, it is a really difficult process that can begin only after the readiness for dialogue of the aggressor and the victim," he said.

The Patriarch of the UGCC said that one should prepare for this process already now.

In his opinion, four steps should be made for the reconciliation between Ukrainians and Russians.

"First of all - reconciliation should start with determining the truth. Without truth no reconciliation is possible. We must recognize those wrongs which we have been inflicted, and to recognize those wrongs which we might have inflicted to someone.

The next step – compensation of damages by the aggressor, and establishing justice. As any injustice should be corrected.

The third step - the victims of unjust aggression, injustice should be honored. They must be reimbursed what they have experienced, returned all material losses, supported in healing both mental and physical wounds. Hence, defiled human dignity should be honored. This is an important and necessary element of reconciliation.

The fourth step is the irreversibility of this process. We must do everything to prevent future similar crimes. Thus, the process of reconciliation has also a preventive significance," summarizes the Primate.

The patriarch also has warned against manipulating the concept of peace, appearement of aggressor being unacceptable, as it further encourages him to do injustice.

Compulsion to peace is also unacceptable, in his view.

"Then the victim must surrender their weapons and stop fighting back the attackers. So, there can be no talk about peace without truth, without justice - of peace, which will not be built on the repentance process and dialogue," he said.

"One should pray for peace. The statesmen will not resort to prayer. It is for believers. I think the Lord God will help us find ways of understanding so that we first received the gift of forgiveness in our own hearts, and thus began a dialogue towards reconciliation, which once would have been crowned with peace," said His Beatitude Sviatoslav (Shevchuk).

The useful book that answers questions about the faith you were too scared to ask

Fr Michael Kerper sheds light on some of the most nagging questions about Catholicism: I have been reading a useful and informative book: A Priest Answers 27 Questions You Never Thought to Ask by Fr Michael Kerper, a parish priest in New Hampshire.

Some of the questions can easily be answered by anyone of my generation who was taught the Catechism, such as "What's the difference between mortal and venial sins?", "What is the Act of Contrition?" and "Is damnation real?"

Others are less easy of definition, such as "Whatever happened to Limbo?" This elicits the author's sensible statement: "As much as we want to know precisely what happens to non-baptized persons - children and good people - the simple truth is that God's revelation doesn't tell us. In the past, Limbo became the favored opinion because many in the Church stressed the necessity of Baptism. Today, however, many theologians, including Pope Benedict XVI, see that opinion as explaining too much, thereby foreclosing possibilities known to God alone."

The corollary to this, "Can I baptize someone?" provides an answer that reminds us, "A Catholic should...refrain from baptizing someone else's child, even a grandchild, and should not feel guilty about it. Such a situation calls for patient sensitivity towards the rights of the parents who have chosen not to baptize their child."

I am reminded of the situation in formerly Communist Russia after the Revolution, when practising your religion could mean death; many grandparents, who looked after grandchildren when their parents worked long hours or had disappeared into the Gulag, and who had retained their own secret practice of the Orthodox faith, probably did baptise their grandchildren. Indeed, former President Gorbachev is on record as saying he was baptised by his grandfather in the Volga River as a young child; he believed it sowed the seeds of his later friendship and rapport with Pope John Paul II.

Another question that interested me was "Do ghosts really exist?" Fr Kerper rephrases it as "Can bodiless souls – ghosts – appear and intervene in our lives?" He explains that of the billions of human beings who have "lost" their bodies through death, "only those few souls whose presence is felt or seen by others are truly ghosts." He believes their existence is "plausible" but that we also have to be very cautious about this phenomenon.

After citing Scriptural instances of ghost stories, he refers to St Thomas Aquinas who believed that saintly apparitions sometimes occur "to bring comfort and encouragement" to the living. St Thomas also stated that the souls of the dead who are not in heaven "can never appear to the living without God's consent." Why would God allow this? St Thomas suggests two reasons: to warn and to seek spiritual assistance, such as prayer. On the question of credible stories of destructive "hauntings", St Thomas insisted that these were most likely "demons masquerading as ghosts." Fr. Kerper reassures us that "the spiritual bonds between the living and the dead, especially those who love one another, are deep, unbreakable, and mysterious because they are rooted in the Body of Christ."

If for any of these or other reasons you cannot receive Holy Communion, you are very welcome to come for a blessing. Please indicate to the priest that you would like to receive his blessing.

Bequests and Wills: Leaving a bequest is a process of giving a donation through your will. It is simply a distribution from your estate to a charitable organization through your last will and testament. It can be as small or as large a donation as you wish.
