Fostering & Serving Unity and Missionary Spirit – Pastoral Letter of His Beatitude Sviatoslav

O Lord Jesus Christ, our Good Shepherd, as you once gathered lost sheep that they might hear Your voice and be your flock, so also today graciously look down from heaven upon our parish community, and send down

on it your Holy Spirit, that it might be a place to receive the joy of Your Good News. Strengthen us with your presence, and always



gather us together in prayer. Grant us the spirit of serving others, so that in our parish all might encounter You, the merciful God. Bless our spiritual leaders with Your wisdom, and inspire us to generously give of our time, talents and treasure for the building up of Your Kingdom. Unite us in peace and harmony, as befits Your community of love. Instill in us a missionary spirit, and let our parish community shine with the light of the Gospel, with prayer and good works, inviting all to share in the divine life, so that Your Name, O Saviour, may be praised, together with Your eternal Father, and your most-holy, good and lifegiving Spirit. Amen.

"A human being today feels the need to belong to a community that holds the same values regarding family, culture, nation, language, profession, vocation. And in spite of all the technological possibilities for social communication, we all still seek authentic personal contact with another person. The most precious moment in life is when one person says to another: "I am yours" or "you are mine." In that moment, a person knows that he or she "belongs" to someone and is part of a special relationship.

When we think about God, we come to understand that special relationship that exists between the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit because such a relationship has parallels in our human experience. In God, everything is common — will, reason, life: "everything of mine is yours and everything of yours is mine" (Jn 17:10). A person who does not know God thinks that God lives His own separate life, and that there is no reason for Him to interfere in my life nor for me to interfere in His. But the kontakion for the feast of the Ascension helps us understand that we are invited to share in God's life: "in no way distant, but remaining inseparable, You cried to those who love You: I am with You and there is none against you." In a special way, God is present to us in the Most Holy Eucharist: "Take, eat: this is my body... Drink of it all of you, this is my blood of

the New Covenant..." (Mt 26:26–28). Christ today says to us: "I am yours and you are mine," and a person responds: "I am Yours and You are mine." Lord, I am here. Lord, I am Yours! (Let us repeat this prayer throughout the day.)" – Mission Days 2017

"Christ said: do this in memory of me, in my memory. Poets leave behind their works in remembrance, sculptors and artists leave their statues or paintings in order that they might be remembered. But the greatest living remembrance has been left for us by Jesus Christ: He gave us His Body, His Blood, so that we might remember – 'do this...' – that this Body and spilled Blood is passed on for the forgiveness of sins." Epistle: A reading from the Acts of the Apostles: (Acts 20:16-18a, 28-38)

In those days, Paul had decided to sail past Ephesus, so as not to lose time in Asia, for he was eager to get to Jerusalem by the feast of Pentecost if at all possible. Paul sent word from Miletus to Ephesus, summoning the presbyters of that church. When they came to him he delivered this address: "keep watch over yourselves, and over the whole flock the Holy Spirit has given you to guard. Shepherd the church of God, which he has acquired at the price of his own blood. I know that when I am gone, savage wolves will come among you who will not spare the flock. From your own number, men will present themselves distorting the truth and leading astray any who follow them. Be on guard, therefore. Do not forget that for three years, night and day, I never ceased warning you

individually even to the point of tears. I commend you now to the Lord, and to that gracious word of his which can enlarge you, and give you a share among all who are consecrated to him. Never did I set my heart on anyone's silver or gold or envy the way he dressed. You yourselves know that these hands of mine have served both my needs and those of my companions. I have always pointed out to you that it is by such hard work that you must help the weak. You need to recall the words of the Lord Jesus himself, who said 'There is more happiness in giving that receiving.''



After this discourse, Paul knelt down with them all and prayed. They began to weep without restrain, throwing their arms around him and kissing him, for they were deeply distressed to hear that they would never see his face again. Then they escorted him to the ship.

Alleluia (Tone 1): The God of gods, the Lord, spoke and summoned the earth from the rising of the sun to its setting (Ps 49:1). Gather to Him His devout ones, who with sacrifice make covenant with Him (Ps 49:5).

Gospel: (John 17:1-13)

At that time, Jesus looked up to heaven and said: "Father, the hour has come! Give glory to your Son that your Son may give glory to you, inasmuch as you have given him authority over all people, that he may bestow eternal life on those you gave him. (Eternal life is this: to know you, the only true God, and him you have sent, Jesus Christ.) I have given you glory on earth by finishing

the work you gave me to do. Do you now, Father, give me glory at your side, a glory I had with you before the world existed. I have made your name known to those you gave me out of the world. These men you gave me were yours; they have kept your word. Now they realize that all that you gave me comes from you.

I entrusted to them the message you entrusted to me, and they received it. They have known that in truth I came from you, they have believed it was you who sent me. For these I pray – not for the world but for these you have given me, for they are really yours. (Just as all that belongs to me is yours, so all that belongs to you is mine.) It is in them that I have been glorified.

I am in the world no more, but these are in the world as I come to you. O Father most holy, protect them with your name which you have given me (that they may be one, even as we are one). As long as I with them, I guarded them with your name which you gave me. I kept careful watch, and none one of them was lost, none but him who was destined to be lost – in fulfillment of Scripture. Now, however, I come to you; I say all this while I am still in the world that they may share my joy completely.

Instead of "It is truly...": O my soul, magnify the Lord who in glory ascended bodily into the heavens.

Irmos (Tone 5): O Mother of God, you transcended both mind and word, and in time, ineffably bore the Timeless One: it is you who, with one accord, we, the faithful magnify.

Communion Verses: Praise the Lord from the heavens; praise Him in the highest (Ps 148:1). Rejoice in the Lord, O you just; praise befits the righteous (Ps 32:1). Alleluia! (3x)

Instead of "We have seen the true light..." Be exalted, O God, above the heavens; above all the earth be Your glory (Ps 56:6). "May our mouths be filled..." Be exalted, O God, above the heavens; above all the earth be Your glory (3x)

"Blessed be the Name of the Lord..." Be exalted, O God, above the heavens; above all the earth be Your glory (3x).

Our Eparch, Bishop Ken is requesting that at the conclusion of every Divine Liturgy we say an additional prayer for Peace in Ukraine until the end of the war. For peace in Ukraine, let us pray: Our Father ... Hail Mary ... Glory be to the Father and to the GRATITUDE

Mission Days 2017 - From the Ascension of our Lord to the Descent of the Holy Spirit, Thursday - May 25th to Sunday - June 4th.

"Go. therefore, and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit," Mt. 28.19

About Mission Days: (Please, do not forget your guidebooks at the entrance to the church)

Through our active participation in the spiritual efforts of these ten Mission Days, once again we are called upon to discover and understand anew that our parish communities and families (domestic churches) are missionary in nature. Such understanding flows from the gift of our Baptism, by virtue of which, and through the power of its mystery, we have committed ourselves to believe, live, serve, and share the experience of our faith in Christ; and not simply with our family members, but with everyone we meet in life. Thus, the mission of our parish community is to allow Christ to enter deeper into our lives, to carry the Good News beyond our own community and to support those who expand the boundaries of the Kingdom of God with their missionary activity and chaplaincy ministry.

From the feast of the Ascension to Pentecost, together with our entire parish community, let us pray that the Lord might renew our life in God by the grace and intercession of the Holy Spirit.

If circumstances do not allow your parish to conduct Mission Days during the week or if you personally cannot participate in them, you are invited to observe Mission Days in your own home, setting aside at least 5 minutes of family time in order to read the Guidebook together (Word of God, Meditation, Quotation-witness, Prayer), and then to discuss among yourselves the Missionary Tasks provided for each day. Another possibility is to observe Mission Days in a prayerful gathering together with other families, with your neighbors, for example.

Prayer: Lord our God, spread the light of Your Holy Gospel, that it may shine through us who are baptized, as children of the Light. Grant that the Christian faith may spread in our society, that we may bear witness to Your living presence in our lives and in our parish community; O Lord, hear us and have mercy. The best way to communicate with difficult people

What should we do when the other person wants us to accept them, but their behavior is just plain wrong? In today's fast-paced world, where most people are more likely to be looking at their phones than making eye contact, simply stopping, listening, and seeing – truly seeing – is a gesture that goes a long way. People need to be noticed and understood, and they are genuinely touched when they realize that someone is trying to see and hear them, to give them their time. Listening is not just a matter of hearing words; it is also about taking in the whole person and what he says and doesn't say, or in the feelings that cross his face or the gestures and movements of his body. Sometimes communication is more body-language based, and sometimes it happens in total silence. It's an art not only to hear but also to listen, taking into account the richness of communications and complexity of people and their history.

Control negative emotional reactions: It's not easy to understand others, especially when they let loose with extreme feelings, irrational behaviors, and harsh words. It takes great effort and self-awareness to be able to welcome and understand someone even when her behavior is unacceptable, incomprehensible, or hurtful. We may need time, effort, and willingness to work on ourselves so that the first flood of emotions can calm down enough for us to get a better view of the situation. We should not act on heightened emotions or let our feelings be destructive. Take time also for yourself so that you can regain your balance and serenity.

Accept the person, not necessarily their actions: It's one thing to understand and accept the person ... but it's another to accept and agree with their actions. The two do not always go together. We can understand and accept the person in all his individuality, uniqueness, and complexity without accepting or condoning all of his actions and decisions. A strong foundation of understanding allows us to express disagreement in such a way that the other person does not feel rejected. We all need someone we trust, someone we can accept when they tell us, "I love you and I understand why you did this, but I disagree with it."

Give it time and remain present: Learning to be in relationships can take a lifetime, starting from the effort in childhood to label and understand feelings. As we continue to grow, we will make mistakes and sometimes we'll get hurt by others' mistakes. It is important not to close ourselves off and or hide from others. (Note: setting protective boundaries against an abusive person is a separate matter.) For well-intentioned people who struggle with their own problems, emotions, and mistakes, that constant open door is a reminder that our love and understanding are deeper than their good or bad choices. It's a reminder that no matter what they've done, they're seen, understood, and loved – and that if they ever do want to change, someone is there to give them a hand.
