Spiritual Combat in the Life of the Christian 785

From the moment of one's Baptism, every Christian enters into spiritual combat. There we die to sin, in order to live for God. This battle, as the apostle Paul teaches, is not about wrestling "... against flesh and blood, but against the rulers, against the authorities, against the cosmic powers over this present darkness, against the spiritual forces of evil in the heavenly places" (Eph 6:12). The Christian engages in spiritual warfare by armed with being prayer, fasting, thus cleanse our thoughts and achieve almsgiving; we dispassion. Saint John Cassian teaches that spiritual combat helps a person achieve perfection: "This battle is in accordance with the will of God. It serves human good and

awakens in a person ardent striving for greater perfection."

1. Fasting and Almsgiving

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Christians have fasted since ancient times. It was and is a way of imitating the forty-day fast of Christ during which he fought the devil's temptations and overcame them. Fasting as a means of spiritual combat was further developed by monastics, who saw it as a means of achieving purity of heart. Fasting takes hold of the entire being: the body through restraint in food and drink, and the soul through restraint of the passions. Saint John Chrysostom teaches: "Do you not eat flesh? Feed not upon indecency by means of the eyes. Let the ear fast also. The fasting of the ear consists in refusing to receive slander and calumnies ... For what does it profit if we abstain from birds and fishes; and yet bite and devour our brothers and sisters?"

Fasting is inextricably linked with almsgiving:

In the day on which you fast you will taste nothing but bread and water; and having reckoned up the price of the dishes of that day which you intended to have eaten, you will give it to a widow, or an orphan, or to some person in want, and thus you will exhibit humility of mind, so that he who has received benefit from your humility may fill his own soul, and pray for you to the Lord.

Basic Guidelines for Reception of Holy Communion:

1. You are a member of the Catholic Church (Orthodox faithful are welcome to receive Holy Communion); 2) You have participated in the Sacrament of Confession at least during the Easter or Christmas seasons this past year if not more frequently; 3) You attend Divine Services regularly; 4) Your lifestyle is consistent with the teaching of the Catholic Church; 5) You have kept the Liturgical fast – no food at least one hour prior to the Divine Liturgy (water and medicine does not break the fast). 6) You have been in church from the beginning of the service, or at least heard the Gospel. 7) To the best of your ability, you are in the state of Grace.

If for any of these or other reasons you cannot receive Holy Communion, you are very welcome to come for a blessing. Please indicate to the priest that you would like to receive his blessing.

Pastoral Ministry and Sacraments:

Reconciliation: on Sundays and Holy Days: before Divine Liturgies and other days, by appointment.

Holy Communion: for the sick, by appointment, any time.

Baptisms: by appointment.

Marriages: six months' notice should be given to the parish priest, and he should be contacted before any other arrangements are made.

Funerals and Memorials: by appointment.

Anointing of the Sick (Holy Unction): Those anticipating surgery, hospitalization or treatments and who would like to receive anointing or to meet with parish priest, please call or email Fr. Andrzej in advance to arrange a time and a day.

** COMMUNAL RIGHT OF MUTUAL FORGIVENESS **

When the disciples of the Lord asked him to teach them how to pray (Luke 11:1-13), He left us with what we refer to as the Lord's Prayer, the "Our Father". In this prayer, we ask God to forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us. Before beginning our Great Fast (Lenten) Journey together, as a parish family community, it is important for us to express to

each other our desire to forgive each other for anything that we may have done that may have hurt or offended someone over the past year, or indeed during our life time so that we can be free without these heavy burdens to walk together as a united family, as true daughters and sons of God! This Communal Right of Mutual Forgiveness is not the Mystery/ Sacrament of Reconciliation (Confession) and does not replace Mystery/Sacrament, but rather is a tangible sign to each other of our forgiveness and also the experience of being forgiven. Hence there is no need to name our offenses, but rather with total sincerity in our hearts let us say to each other: "Forgive me sister/ brother" and answer with sincerity and love, "May God have mercy on you, and know that I forgive you."



Priest: Bless me, my Sisters and Brothers, and forgive me, a sinner, whatever offenses I may have committed this day and all the days of my life by word, deed and thought as well as by all my senses (bows to all the faithful).

Faithful: May God forgive you, Reverend Father. Bless us also and forgive our offences voluntary and involuntary (also bow).

Priest: May the Lord God by His grace forgive you all your sins and have mercy on you.

Let us pray for our Most Holy Universal Pontiff, Francis Pope of Rome, for His Beatitude Patriarch Sviatoslav, for our Most Reverend Metropolitan Lawrence, for our God-loving Bishop Ken and the God-loving Bishop Severian.

Faithful: May God save and have mercy.

Priest: For the noble benefactors and founders of this holy church, for those who serve and who have served in it.

Faithful: May God save and have mercy.

Priest: For those who are absent and for those who are travelling.

Faithful: May God protect and have mercy.

Priest: For our benefactors and those who are kind to us.

Faithful: May God reward and have mercy.

Priest: For those who hate us and for those who love us.

Faithful: May God forgive and have mercy.

Priest: For the sick and suffering.

Faithful: May God heal and have mercy.

During Morning Mass, Francis Reminds Not to Put Off Changing Your Ways Until Tomorrow

You are not sure how and when your life will end. Hence, examine your conscience, dominate your passions, and convert without delay.

According to Vatican News, Pope Francis stressed this during his daily morning Mass at his residence, Casa Santa Marta.

Stop for a while to acknowledge our failures, aware that the end can come any moment, and let us not continue living as we want under the impression that God's compassion is infinite.

Recalling today's advice in the First Reading from the Book of Sirach, the Roman Pontiff called on the faithful to have a change of heart and convert to the Lord.

Wisdom, the Jesuit Pope highlighted, is a daily thing that comes from reflecting on life and from stopping to think about how one lives.

"Do not follow your instincts, your strength, indulging in the passions of your heart," Francis warned, acknowledging all have passions, but one must be careful and dominate them.

The Holy Father recognized that passions are not bad things, but they need to be managed. "They are like blood that helps do many good things but if you are not able to dominate them, they will dominate you," he said.

Francis reminded those in his chapel that we are not eternal and therefore cannot do whatever we want, trusting in God's infinite mercy.

Don't believe you will get away with it

"So don't be rash and reckless and believe that you will get away with it," the Pontiff admonished, saying: "You may get away with it once, but you don't know what's next."

"Don't say: 'God's compassion is great, he'll forgive me my many sins,' and so I continue doing what I want," Francis underscored, adding: "Regarding this, the advice of the father or grandfather is: "Don't wait to convert yourself to the Lord, don't postpone it from day to day because the anger of the Lord will suddenly burst forth."

Don't Put Off Conversion For Tomorrow

The Pope went on to give some daily homework, requiring only five minutes a day: "Let's take a little time every day to examine our conscience, to convert to the Lord, without putting it off for tomorrow."

"Try to not to let it happen again and if you manage to control yourself and not be controlled by your passion, perhaps it may happen less," he said.

Again stressing that no one is sure of how and when our life will end, Francis concluded, reminding: "Five minutes at the end of each day will help us think about a change of heart and conversion to the Lord, without procrastination."
