Brothers and Sisters, see what large letters I make when I am writing in my own hand! It is those who want to make a good

showing in the flesh that try to compel you to be circumcised only that they may not be persecuted for the cross of Christ. Even the circumcised do not themselves obey the law, but they want you to be circumcised so that they may boast about your flesh. May I never boast of anything except the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, by which the world has been crucified to me, and I to the world. For neither circumcision nor uncircumcision is anything; but a new creation is everything! As for those who will follow this rule—peace be upon them, and mercy, and upon the Israel of God.

From now on, let no one make trouble for me; for I carry the marks of Jesus branded on my body.

Gospel - Luke 16:19-31



The Lord told this parable: "There was a rich

man who was dressed in purple and fine linen and who feasted sumptuously every day. And at his gate lay a poor man named Lazarus, covered with sores, who longed to satisfy his hunger with what fell from the rich man's table; even the dogs would come and lick his sores. The poor man died and was carried away by the angels to be with Abraham. The rich man also died and was buried. In Hades, where he was being tormented, he looked up and saw Abraham far away with Lazarus by his side. He called out, 'Father Abraham, have mercy on me, and send Lazarus to dip the tip of his finger in water and cool my tongue; for I am in agony in these flames.' But Abraham said, 'Child, remember that during your lifetime you received your good things, and Lazarus in like manner evil things; but now he is comforted here, and you are in agony. Besides all this, between you and us a great chasm has been fixed, so that those who might want to pass from here to you cannot do so, and no one can cross from there to us.' He said, 'Then, father, I beg you to send him to my father's house— for I have five brothers—that he may warn them, so that they will not also come into this place of torment.' Abraham replied, 'They have Moses and the prophets; they should listen to them.' He said, 'No, father Abraham; but if someone goes to them from the dead, they will repent.' He said to him, 'If they do not listen to Moses and the prophets, neither will they be convinced even if someone rises from the dead.'"

** To Ponder – The Fathers & Mothers Speak ***

"See, the more sumptuously the rich man lived, the more Lazarus was humbled! The more Lazarus was made low, the greater was his crown. Why should he have seen Abraham above all the just, and Lazarus in his bosom? He saw him because Abraham loved the poor and so that we might learn that we cannot hope for pardon at the end, unless the fruits of pardon can be seen in us." **St. Ephrem the Syrian**

"Our body has this defect that, the more it is provided care and comforts, the more needs and desires it finds.... Let nothing disturb you. Let nothing make you afraid. All things are passing. God alone never changes. Patience gains all things. If you have God you will want for nothing. God alone suffices." **St. Teresa of Avila.**

Just as, when God expelled Adam from paradise, he settled him opposite the garden in order that the continual sight might renew his suffering and give him a clearer awareness of his fall from the good, so also He settled the rich man opposite Lazarus in order that he might see the good of which he had deprived himself. 'I sent,' he says, 'the poor man Lazarus to your gate to teach you virtue and to receive your love; you ignored this benefit and declined to use his assistance toward your salvation. Hereafter you shall use him to bring yourself a greater punishment and retribution.'

From the poor man we learn that all who suffer curses and injustice among us will stand before us in that other life. Indeed, Lazarus suffered no injustice from the rich man; for the rich man did not take Lazarus' money, but failed to share his own. If he is accused by the man he failed to pity because he did not share his own wealth, what pardon will the man receive who has stolen others' goods, when he is surrounded by those whom he has wronged? In that world there is no need of witnesses, accusers, evidence, or proof; the deeds themselves just as we have done them appear before our eyes. 'See the man,' He says, 'and his works: indeed, this also is theft, not to share one's possessions." **St John Chrysostom**



CATECHETICAL SUMMARY

In the Gospel today we are reminded (and warned) that the way we live in this life will have everything to do with how we live in the next. While some may use this Gospel to condemn money or riches in general, this is a misuse of the text. The Gospel reminds us that it is not the **"good things**" which are evil but what we do with what we have that matters. While the "rich man" was blessed to have many good things, he refused to share these blessings with those around him.

In the end it is Lazarus who is remembered by name and whose virtue is proclaimed in the Church today while the "rich man" remains nameless. He who made a name for himself on this earth is forgotten by the very ones he wanted to impress while the one who was counted lower than the dogs on this earth is elevated today by public proclamation in every church throughout the world.

PRACTICAL QUESTIONS:

- 1. What was so evil about the rich man's life that he was sent to hell?
- 2. What was so virtuous about Lazarus' life that we gained life eternal?
- 3. If eternal life is the life of God, what kind of life must we live if we hope to live forever?
- 4. How does the life of Lazarus conform to God's life?

Tobit 4:7 "Do not turn your face away from any poor man, and the face of God will not be turned away from you."



New Westminster Clergy Conference – will take place this coming Wednesday, Oct. 27th, 2021 starting at 9:00 a.m.

National Internment Commemoration Day on Thursday, October 28th, 2021 - During Canada's first national internment operations of 1914 to 1920, a total of 8,579 men, women and children were branded as "enemy aliens" and interned. Among them were Ukrainians, Alevi Kurds, Armenians, Bulgarians, Croatians, Czechs, Germans, Hungarians, Italians, Jews, Ottoman Turks, Polish, Romanians, Russians, Serbians, Slovaks and Slovenes, of which most were Ukrainians and most were civilians.

The Metropolia of Winnipeg – Wednesday, November 3, 2021 will mark the 65th Anniversary of the creation of the Metropolia of Winnipeg as an ecclesiastical province by Pope Pius XII. On November 3, 1956, the Eparchies of Winnipeg, Edmonton, Saskatoon, and Toronto were organized into a new ecclesiastical province, the first



outside Ukraine. The Eparchy of New Westminster was later established on June 27, 1974.

- starting next Sunday we will be collecting non-perishable


items or monetary donations for the Kamloops food bank. Thank you for your support.
