After the priest has exclaimed, "Blessed be the Kingdom..." and the people have responded, "Amen," the clergy sing the Paschal Troparion once and the people repeat it. Then, the clergy sing the first half, and the people conclude it.

Paschal Troparion - Christ is risen from the dead, * trampling death by death, * and to those in the tombs * giving life.

Troparion, Tone 7: While the tomb was sealed, O Christ God, You dawned as life from the sepulchre, and while the doors were shut, You came to Your disciples, the Resurrection of all, renewing a right spirit in us through them, according to Your great mercy.

+Glory be to the Father and to the Son and to the Holy Spirit, now and for ever and ever. Amen.

Kontakion, Tone 8: With his searching hand, Thomas explored Your life-giving side, O Christ God. For when You entered while the doors were shut, he called out to You with the rest of the Apostles: You are my Lord and my God!

Prokeimenon, Tone 3: Great is our Lord and great is His strength; * and of His knowledge there is no end.

verse: Praise the Lord, for a psalm is good; may praise be sweet to our God.

Epistle: A reading from the Acts of the Apostles (Acts 5:12-20):

In those days, many signs and wonders were done among the people through the apostles. And they were all together in Solomon's Portico. None of the rest dared to join them, but the people held them in high esteem. Yet more than ever, believers were added to the Lord, great numbers of both men and women, so that they even carried out the sick into the streets, and laid them on cots and mats in order that Peter's shadow might fall on some of them as he came by. A great number of people would also gather from the towns around

Jerusalem, bringing the sick and those tormented by unclean spirits, and they were all cured. Then the high priest took action; he and all who were with him (that is, the sect of the Sadducees), being filled with jealousy, arrested the apostles and put them in the public prison. But during the night, an angel of the Lord opened the prison doors, brought them out, and said, "Go, stand in the temple and tell the people the whole message about this life."

Alleluia, Tone 8: Come, let us sing joyfully to the Lord, let us acclaim God our Saviour.

verse: For God is the great Lord and the great king over all the earth.



Gospel: John 20:19-31:

When it was evening on that day, the first day of the week, and the doors of the house where the disciples had met were locked for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." After he said this, he showed them his hands and his side. Then the disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord. Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you." When he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained."

But Thomas (who was called the Twin), one of the twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. So the other disciples told him, "We have seen the Lord." But he said to them, "Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands, and put my finger in the mark of the nails and my hand in his side, I will not believe." A week later his disciples were again in the house, and Thomas was with them. Although the doors were shut, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here and see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it in my side. Do not doubt, but believe." Thomas answered him, "My

Lord and my God!" Jesus said to him, "Have you believed because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe." Now Jesus did many other signs in the presence of his disciples, which are not written in this book. But these are written so that you may come to believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that through believing, you may have life in his name. "

Hymn to the Mother of God

The Angel cried out to the One full of Grace: O chaste Virgin, rejoice! And again I say, Rejoice! Your Son has risen from the tomb on the third day, and raised the dead. Let all people rejoice! Shine, shine, O new Jerusalem, for the glory of the Lord has risen upon you! Exult now and be glad, O Sion! And you, O chaste Mother of God, take delight in the resurrection of your Son.

Communion Hymn - Praise the Lord, O Jerusalem. * Praise your God, O Sion. * Alleluia, alleluia, * alleluia. (Psalm 147:1)

Instead of "Blessed is He Who comes..." we sing:

"Christ is risen from the dead, * trampling death by death, * and to those in the tombs* giving life."

Instead of "We have seen the true light..." we sing: "Christ is risen from the dead ... "

Instead of "May our mouths be filled..." & "Blessed be the name of the Lord..." we sing three times: "Christ is risen ...

At the dismissal, instead of "Glory be to the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit ... we chant: "Christ is risen ... "

After the final Amen, the priest, with cross raised on high, exclaims "Christ is risen" thrice and we respond "Truly, He is risen" each time.

Then the Troparion "Christ is risen" is sung as at the beginning of the Liturgy, but with the addition:

"And to us he has granted life eternal; * we bow down before his resurrection on the third day."



Thomas Sunday

Today's Gospel is proclaiming the appearance of the risen Lord to His disciples eight days after the Resurrection when Thomas was then present and proclaimed "My Lord and my God" upon seeing the

hands and side of Christ. In the Church services for this day, the stress is on the Apostle Thomas' vision of Christ and the significance of the words of Jesus: "Have you believed because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and yet believe".

We don't need to touch Jesus physically to have faith. But upon hearing of Christ, we can be spiritually moved by His presence to follow Him, and trust in His promise that all people will be raised on the day He appoints for judgment. Then we can everlastingly live either in the eternal joy of being reunited with God, or eternally suffer the torment of being without Him.

St. Peter heard and understood, as he writes to his flock: "You did not see Him, yet you loved Him; and still without seeing Him you are filled with a joy so glorious that it cannot be described, because you believe; and you are sure of the end to which your faith looks forward, that is, the salvation of your souls."

This Sunday is also called Antipascha (meaning "in the stead of Pascha," not "in opposition to Pascha") because with this day, the first Sunday after Pascha, the Church consecrates every Sunday of the year to the commemoration of Pascha, that is, the Resurrection of Our Lord, God and Saviour Jesus Christ.

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

Patriarch Sviatoslav spoke about the actions of the UGCC in times of war.

The territory of Ukraine in the war was conditionally divided into three zones. The first is

active combat operations. Then it included just Kyiv and the region. The reaction and specific actions that needed to be done here were very different from what happened in western Ukraine. The second zone is adjacent to the places where fighting is taking place. And the third is a quieter part of Central and Western Ukraine. And in each zone, we, as a church, acted differently.

This was stated by the head of the UGCC in an interview with Novoye Vremya.

"In the war zone, they unanimously decided to stay put, to be with their people. We were there ourselves, and we helped others leave. We tried to arrange bomb shelters, feed these people, clothe them and deliver the necessary assistance. But at the same time, help those people who want to move – transport, advice, contacts, and so on. We set up logistics to supply humanitarian supplies to those hot spots.

In the area adjacent to the hot spots, we have created logistics centers and Refugee Assistance Centers that are on the way. For example, in the first weeks, the only road of life used by millions from East to West was from Uman to Vinnytsia and then to Khmelnytskyi (because the Kyiv-Zhytomyr highway was closed). This route was not adapted for the simultaneous movement of so many people. It was possible to get from Uman to Khmelnytskyi or Lviv in at least 27 hours. Just imagine the mass of people on the road all these days. And then we tried to help fill up the car, feed those people, warm them up, dress them. When someone wanted to, we created an opportunity for them to spend the night.

On the other hand, we did everything possible to get other trucks moving from West to East. There were circumstances when drivers sometimes did not have much courage to move further east – they reached the south of the Kyiv region, the Zhytomyr region, or the Vinnytsia region. So it was necessary to unload this large cargo on smaller buses and dispatch it along the field roads to where it was most needed. It was a huge effort. But such logistics centers have started working here. I visited them, and I was amazed by the ingenuity of our priests and the immense activity of the volunteers. Without volunteers and spontaneous responses from people from different churches who joined the mission of our church, it would have been difficult to do all this.

And the third zone is a calmer Western Ukraine, which accepted refugees. It was necessary to accommodate them at someplace, provide a roof over their heads, provide housing conditions, in particular for women and children," Patriarch Svyatoslav said.
